OPEN CLASS

Please note that Open Class entries, other than animals, will be accepted at the <u>side door</u> of the youth building this year!

Open class is for youth and adult exhibitors. However, youth are encouraged to enter their projects, which they created while enrolled in an educational youth organization, into Junior Fair. If they enter projects in open class, they will be judged against exhibitors of any age. They also need to understand that judging in Open class is different than in Junior class, in that there are only four placings in any given lot even if more than four items are entered in the lot, whereas in Junior class all items will get a placing, (if not otherwise disqualified for some reason), even if more than four items are entered in the lot.

For Open Class:

- All exhibits must be the result of the labor of the person exhibiting.
- •No items which have been judged previously at the Head of the Lakes Fair may be entered again.
- All open class fair entries are judged using the American System.
- No exhibits shall be paid more than one premium under any one lot number.
- •No premiums are awarded to specimens or exhibits deemed not worthy by the judges.
- •Small items may be packaged in zippered bags.
- •Be sure to check the specific instructions under each department for further requirements.
- "Any other article or exhibit" cannot be a duplicate of another lot number. It can only be an exhibit that does not fit in any other lot number.
- •In classes where the number of entries is three or less, the judge shall use his/her discretion as to whether the ranking exhibits shall be awarded first, second, third, or fourth premiums.
- Proper precaution will be taken to guard against accidents or loss, but in no case will the fair be responsible for loss or accident from any cause.
- All entries must be registered online or paper registration forms must be received by mail or in the fair office by midnight on Sunday, July 11, 2021.
- •All entries must be brought to the fairgrounds on Tuesday, July 20, 2021 between 12 noon and 6 PM, with the exception of Department 10-Animal Science (see the livestock exhibit info below for details), and Departments 14-Plant and Soil Sciences, 15-Flowers and House Plants and 25-Foods and Nutrition. Departments 14, 15 and 25 exhibits may be brought to the fairgrounds between 10 am and noon on Wednesday to maintain freshness before judging. If desired, Departments 14, 15 and 25 may also be dropped off during the time other exhibits are brought in on Tuesday between noon and 6 p.m.
- All entries must be pre-registered. No registrations will be accepted the day of the fair.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

- Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, and Goats must be on the fairgrounds by 5 PM on Tuesday.
- •Before unloading livestock or horses find the superintendent of the respective barn to see what paperwork is required before unloading.

- Entries will be governed by the state health rules for livestock exhibits.
- Due to state health recommendations for swine this year, the fair management group has decided that the fair will hold a terminal show for swine this year. That means that every pig and hog that comes to the fairgrounds must go directly to slaughter at the end of the fair.
- Animals brought in for the Department 10 Animal Science need to be brought in at the time indicated on the open class judging schedule and they must be taken home immediately afterward.
- •No animal entered for exhibition, unless noted otherwise in these guidelines, shall be removed before 5 PM on the last day of the fair without written consent of the barn superintendent and fair manager. Any violation of this rule may result in a forfeit of premiums.
- •The Fair reserves the right to refuse to pay any premium on any livestock exhibit in this department which has not been exhibited in the show ring, at the request of the judge or his assistants, by the actual owner or feeder through the year, of said exhibit. This includes calves and sheep.
- Exhibitors and visitors will be prohibited from handling livestock other than their own without consent of the owners.

EXHIBITOR AND OBSERVER GUIDELINES DURING JUDGING

During judging, exhibitors and non-participating observers are permitted to watch the judge making his or her decisions. However, exhibitors and observers are not to interrupt the judging in process. Questions may be asked of the superintendent after the class has been judged, and then the judge is to explain the process in question. If you interrupt during judging, your entries in that department will be disqualified and all your entries in the fair may be disqualified.

SCHEDULE FOR JUDGING OPEN CLASS EXHIBITS

There will be a schedule for dates and general times for open class judging published in the premium guide and online.

DEPARTMENT 1 - DAIRY CATTLE

Registration papers on all purebred bulls or purebred females must be furnished.

The age classes for dairy cattle will be composed as follows:

- Spring Calf born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.
- Winter Calf born between Dec. 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.
- Fall Calf Born between Sept. 1 and Nov. 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- •Summer Yearling Heifer Born between June 1 and Aug. 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- Spring Yearling Heifer Born between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- Winter Yearling Heifer Born between Dec. 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- Fall Yearling Heifer Born between Sept. 1 and Nov. 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.
- •Two-Year-Old Born between Sept. 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and Aug. 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year old includes a yearling that has freshened.
- •Three-Year-Old Cow Born between Sept. 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and Aug. 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.
- Four-Year-Old Cow Born between Sept. 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and Aug. 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.
- Five-Year-Old Cow Born on or before Sept 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year.

Group classes are defined as follows:

- Junior Get of Sire shall consist of 3 animals, which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. The name of the sire shall be designated by exhibitor. A single exhibitor need not own the animals.
- •Senior Get of Sire shall consist of 3 animals, which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. The exhibitor shall designate the name of the sire. A single exhibitor need not own the animals.
- Produce of Dam shall consist of 2 animals, of any age or sex, which are the produce of one cow.
- Group of 3 Best Females Cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

- Junior Yearling born during the period January 1 to April 30 of year preceding exhibit year.
- •Senior Yearling born during the period September 1 to December 31 of second year preceding exhibit year.
- •Two-Year-Old and Older born before September 1 of second year preceding exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.

Group classes are defined as follows:

- Junior Get of Sire: Group shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, and/or the summer yearling, bull and heifer classes with both sexes to be represented.
- •Senior Get of Sire: Group shall consist of 3 animals, which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. The exhibitor shall designate name of sire. The animals do not need to be owned by a single exhibitor.

Entries will be governed by the state health rules for livestock exhibits and by special rules in this department. Due to state health recommendations for swine this year, the fair management group has decided that the fair will hold a terminal show for swine this year. That means that every pig and hog that comes to the fairgrounds must go directly to slaughter at the end of the fair.

Special Rules: Swine entered must be owned by the individuals or firms exhibiting them, but the progeny of animals may be shown simply as proof of their qualities without such ownership.

The age classes for swine are as follows:

- A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- A senior boar or sow is one born between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- A senior spring boar or sow pig is one born between January 1 and February 28 (29) of the exhibit year.
- A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

All purebred matured stock must be registered in recognized American Registry Book, if such has been established. A certificate of registry will positively be required in every case, with entry, and if no American Registry Book has been established, certificate of registry must be furnished from Foreign Registry Book. Swine less than one year old the progeny of registered sires and dams, may be entered without registry number by furnishing satisfactory proof of their pedigree.

No animals having hereditary unsoundness will be allowed to compete for premiums in Dept 3 and all animals over two years old must give evidence that they have produced young within the last 10 months.

DEPARTMENT 4 - SHEEP

Entries in this department will be governed by the state health rules governing livestock exhibits and by special rules in this department. **Special Rules:** Sheep entered must be owned by the individuals or firms exhibiting them, but the progeny of animals may be shown simply as proof of their breeding qualities without such ownership. Definite proof of ownership must be furnished for each exhibit in all classes. No more than two premiums shall be awarded to an exhibitor under one lot number. No ram may be shown by two different owners. All rams over 1 year old must be accompanied by evidence of registry in the government recognized flock books of their respective breeds, and purebred rams under one year must be shown to be eligible in the registry books specified above.

Documentation of current scrapies certification required.

Registered wool breeds shall be shown with 2 inches or less of wool. All meat breeds shall have been completely shorn not more than 2 months nor less than 2 weeks prior to show date.

No animals having hereditary unsoundness will be allowed to compete for premiums in Dept 4 and all animals over two years old must give evidence that they have produced young within the last 10 months. Up to 6 sheep allowed in a pen.

The age classes for sheep are as follows:

- •Spring Lamb: A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.
- Winter Lamb: A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.
- Fall Lamb: A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.
- Yearling Ram or Ewe: A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the dates above. The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.
- Mature Ram or Ewe: A mature ram or ewe is one born prior to January 1 of the preceding year.
- Market Lamb: A market lamb is one born after January 1 of the exhibit year.

Group classes:

- **Get of Sire** shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.
- An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes, and 2 ewe lambs, which are owned by the exhibitor.

DEPARTMENT 7 - POULTRY

- 1. Each exhibitor is limited to 10 entries.
- 2. Cage rent of \$0.50 per day will be charged and collected on entry day.
- 3. The exhibitor must verify the date of hatching and the date of purchase and location that the birds came from. The exhibitor must own all poultry for at least 2 months before the fair.
- 4. All poultry and waterfowl must originate from flocks designated as US Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate Flock and be accompanied by a NPIP certificate or have a DATCP-issued certificate showing they originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the fair and they must be individually identified with a wing band or leg band. For regulatory purposes, domesticated fowl are considered to be sexually mature at 4 months.
- 5. Birds should be treated for mites prior to the fair.
- 6. Any bird showing symptoms of sickness will be removed from the showroom and cared for and the exhibitor will be notified.
- 7. Cages, dishes for water and food, and water are furnished by the fair. Feed is not provided; you must bring your own. Each exhibitor is responsible for caring for his or her animals.
- 8. Precautions will be taken to guard against accident or loss, but in no case will the fair be responsible for loss or accident from any cause.
- 9. So far as possible, all single entries will be cooped singly, but the fair reserves the right to coop two specimens in a single coop if necessary.
- 10. Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the owner.
- 11. The judge will be authorized to disqualify any bird he feels is unworthy as an entry.
- 12. All awards will be made by comparison. The judge will use the latest American Standard of Perfection as a guide.
- 13. Immediately after the awards are made, a card stating the premium will be placed on the coop and must remain there until the close of the show. No names, advertising matter, or decoration will be permitted until after the awards are made. No one may bring in other birds to sell without the superintendent's permission and those birds must also be accompanied by proof of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid conducted within 90 days.
- 14. Terms used are defined as follows:
 - Cock a male bird hatched before January 1 of this year
 - Hen a female bird hatched before January 1 of this year
 - Cockerel a male bird hatched after January 1 of this year
